
How to participate in ABOHNS Continuing Certification Credits (MOC) through the AAOA's CME Activities


Starting in 2020, AAOA CME Programs Offer ABOHNS Continuing Certification (MOC) Part II: Self-Assessment credits. If you are interested in taking advantage of this added value to AAOA's CME activities, there are two steps you must take to participate and claim ABOHNS Continuing Certification Credits (MOC).

1. Set up Your AAOA Profile to Claim Continuing Certification Credits (MOC) – please go to step 2 if you have already set-up your profile to claim MOC credits.

- Login to your AAOA portal:
 - Visit https://aaoa.cloud-cme.com/default.aspx
 - Click Sign In in the upper left corner and enter your email and password
 - You can call the AAOA office at 202-955-5010 during regular business hours for assistance login into your AAOA Portal.
- Go to "My CME" (1)
- Click on "My Profile" (2)



- Once on your profile, there are several updates that you will have to make:
 - First, make sure that your birth month and birth day are part of your "Basic Information" in your profile (3)
 - Scroll down to "Maintenance of Certification (MOC) and answer "Yes" to the "Will you be claiming MOC points?" (4)



- A permission statement will appear (5). You must provide permission to for the AAOA to share your information for reporting purpose to ACCME if you would like to claim ABOHNS Continuing Certification (MOC) credits.
- Select the MOC Board (ABOto) (6) and enter your diplomate ID (7). A link to find your diplomate ID is available under the Board selection if needed.
- Once all this information is entered, scroll all the way down and click "Submit"
 - If you do not click "Submit" your changes will not be saved.


Please note that you only need to set-up your profile once to claim ABOHNS Continuing Certification credits (MOC) credits, but will have to sign up to participate for every new activity you register for that you want to claim MOC credit for.

2. Select the MOC Credit product when registering for a CME activity

Once your profile is set up to claim ABOHNS Continuing Certification credits, you are eligible participate in the ABOHNS Continuing Certification (MOC) Part II: Self-Assessment credits.

The next step to claim Continuing Certification credits for an AAOA CME activity is to select the MOC Credit product when registering.

- When getting to the "Registration" part of the process, you must first select the registration type (1).
 - As a reminder, AAOA members can register for AAOA courses and ondemand Clinical Insight Modules at a discount rate, so you must be logged into your AAOA portal to receive AAOA member rate.
- Next check the box to claim MOC credits (2). By clicking the box, AAOA will
 know that you want ABOHNS Continuing Certification credits to be claimed for
 the specific activity you are registering for.



After attending an AAOA activity, you will need complete the test (Clinical Insight Modules) or the post-course survey (live or virtual activities) to claim your CME credits.

The AAOA will provide attendees up to 30 days to update their profile to claim MOC credits and take the post-course survey or test. After the 30 days, the AAOA will submit the participation completion information to ACCME and may not be able to assist in reporting MOC credits after that time.

Additional Information

As a pilot year, the AAOA making the participation in ABOHNS Continuing Certification credits (MOC) free in 2020 with your CME course and on-demand registration. MOC opt-in option is complimentary until the completion of a course.

You will be asked to pay \$100 late fee if you miss the deadline and still want to claiming Continuing Certification credits (MOC) for that activity.
